Association Update

Dear AFRA Members,

Greetings from the Board and AFRA team. We are here to support member companies during these challenging times. We'll be hosting more virtual events to dialogue about the latest industry insights.



In the meantime, I'd like to share some current data on Boeing's market outlook. This unprecedented situation is unique in many ways, with full effects yet to be revealed as dynamic conditions continue to unfold. As we all continue to navigate the changes we'll keep sharing information to inform scenario planning, and welcome your perspectives.

Overall aviation traffic:

- IATA is forecasting global traffic to drop 55% this year leading to over \$80B in losses. We are seeing unprecedented demand shock in terms of depth as well as breadth for the industry. We hit bottom in April at ~20% of global operations and have since seen a steady, but slow recovery. Flights are still running at only about half of normal levels led by domestic and short-haul operations.
- It's still early to call a specific trajectory for recovery due to high uncertainty around the virus and economic impacts. However, many baseline scenarios anticipate getting back to 2019 levels again in 2023.
- In terms of traffic, short-haul typically leads long-haul in recoveries. That's no different this time, and may even be amplified due to health restrictions that are causing governments to limit cross border travel. Single aisle operations are running at ~55% of January levels while passenger twin aisle operations

There are relative bright spots:

- Domestic markets have seen stronger recoveries in many countries. For example, China has returned to 80% of early 2020 operations.
- Air cargo markets have also seen relative resiliency.
 With roughly half of global air cargo capacity flying
 in the bellies of passenger airplanes, lost passenger
 widebody capacity has meant an overall decline in
 traffic of ~15% in the first half of 2020. Demand is
 outpacing available capacity, however, with main
 deck freighter operations running at 110% of normal
 and yields up ~35%. Several carriers with both major
 passenger and cargo flights earned operating profits
 in 2Q20 due to their cargo revenue, despite near
 shutdowns of their passenger businesses.

What might it all mean for retirements and fleet planning?

- Near term, airlines are keeping a portion of their fleet service ready to capture recovery. Roughly 75% of the single aisle passenger fleet operates weekly, and 60% of the twin aisle fleet is flying weekly, including passenger airplanes conducting cargo only missions.
- Longer term, airline emphasis will be on versatility, efficiency, and catch-up in pent-up replacement demand due to above average growth of the last decade.
- So how many airplanes might we expect to retire?
 One way to scope this is to look at older airplanes that were likely approaching retirement before COVID hit. About 4,000 airplanes wereover 20 years old in service as we entered the pandemic.
- However, we know age isn't the only determinant. Elements such as fleet size, commonality, maintenance cycles, etc. also drive individual airline decisions. And, sometimes, older airplanes remain in the fleet due to network fit and unique value propositions. In addition, financing structures can also drive near-term airline decisions. Taking into account airline announcements to date, near-term lease renewals and bankruptcy filings, up to 2,500 airplanes could exit the fleet. Some will likely fly again with other operators as financiers find avenues to return the airplanes to service.

In past downturns, aviation has proven to be resilient over the long term. We can be proud of the critical role flying continues to play in airlifting supplies, medical teams and other transport aspects of the pandemic.
